Glass was put on the WANTED posters as enemy #1. News report after news report indicated communities all over the country were no longer accepting glass as a recycling commodity. NRRA believed there was a better way. And without knowing where the path would lead, calls were made, leads followed, research done. A better way was found. The pioneering glass program created by the NRRA is up, functioning and has the potential to divert more glass than ever before. This is just a small example of the value of the NRRA. The glue of our organization is our shared belief in the value of discards as resources.

It's built into our collective ethos. I'm proud of who we are, and my sense is we are just getting started in driving our mission. I want to extend my appreciation to the staff at the NRRA. The talent of the staff is legion. The Board of Trustees- thank you for devoting your time and energy to guiding this ship. And to you, the members for which this organization exists- the heart only beats with blood coursing through the veins and you are the lifeblood of the NRRA. Thank you for believing.

It gives me great pleasure to report that NRRA has managed to navigate through the troubled waters of international recycling markets and finish the fiscal year with another balanced budget. Credit goes to the staff for keeping NRRA in the black despite continued market volatility.

I'm also happy to share that NRRA successfully moved over 54,000 tons of recyclables on behalf of its members as well as returned more than \$ 5.8 million in revenues – both increased amounts over last year. A large part of this achievement is due to the quality of materials marketed by NRRA members.

This year, the NRRA Board of Trustees made a commitment to increase its reserve account as part our long-term financial planning efforts. This goal will be achieved by setting aside a designated amount as part of the annual NRRA operational budget with additional funds being added when a surplus exists. NRRA's financial position remains strong, and we continue to make improvements such as IT upgrades and electronic payments/invoicing to provide our members with the most efficient service possible.

In August, NRRA confirmed it had received another USDA grant for the fiscal year 2018/2019. This \$140,193 grant will continue and build upon the work that NRRA has done in the previous four grants. Specifically, NRRA will be working with schools and towns in NH, VT and MA stressing "YIMBY" ("Yes, In My Backyard") as encouragement and training for more compost systems.

NRRA is fortunate to be financially secure so it can continue its efforts on your behalf, and we stand ready to face whatever challenges the upcoming year may bring.





Some communities are even starting to use glass in some DPW applications. Last year at the annual meeting of this oldest and first in the nation recycling cooperative, we validated the absolute necessity to continue NRRA's two-part mission which it has followed since its inception. NRRA continues to provide a clearinghouse for current, up-to-date information and act as a source of technical and marketing assistance in the general areas of waste reduction and recycling.

Since last November, the world has seen a titanic shift in the international markets. This shift has exposed the urgent need for new domestic market capacity as well as increased pressure to reduce the production of material that

In addition to the impact of China closing its markets to the US and the rest of the world, a second significant event has provided us with the opportunity to make a real difference.

Over the course of the last year, numerous articles on the crisis of plastic in the ocean have been noted virally by the world's population. These articles have galvanized the world to come to a common understanding that plastic in the ocean is plain wrong. Much like the Cuyahoga River in Ohio being on fire in the 1960's, the Crying Indian anti-litter campaign of the 1970's, and, finally, the New York City garbage barge circling the globe looking for a home in the 1980's, the China National Sword impact and the plastic bag at the bottom of the Mariana's trench creates a new crucible moment in the resource recovery industry.

2019 will be the year of the worm as NRRA will be concentrating on reducing organics in the waste stream by putting composting programs in every back yard. Towns, schools, and residences can all benefit from reducing the increasingly projected higher MSW

I believe that the dedication of the NRRA Membership, the NRRA Staff and the NRRA Board will be a critical part, going forward, of the solutions needed to all the challenges we face today. Thank you all for allowing me to assist in these critical efforts.

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Over the last year, The CLUB has been very busy working on special projects. In addition to hosting four terrific Trash On the Lawn Day (TOLD) events, we continued to provide school outreach in Vermont through our Solid Waste Implementation Plan (SWIP) program, as well as providing support for our latest USDA **Town & Gown** Grant. This unique grant worked to strengthen ties between schools and their municipal transfer stations and waste management districts. We helped produce webinars for town and school officials in NH and VT to cross-train them on their local recycling programs. In addition, the grant provided for updating a hazardous waste manual for schools, which is in publication at the time of this writing. Kudos to Grant Manager Cindy Sterling and School CLUB Special Projects Manager Sarah McGraw for their tireless work on this grant. There will be no rest for Cindy and Sarah. We are proud to announce that we have received another USDA grant! **YIMBY! Yes-In My Back Yard!** will focus on composting and battery disposal efforts in NH, VT and MA.

The Allenstown Elementary Drama Club delighted the Conference audience with their lively performance of The Green Machine in which the students sang and danced their way from a polluted park to a litter-free park.

Our Conference Workshops ran the gamut: Repair Cafes, Student Leadership, Vermicomposting, Share Tables, Sustainability and Ocean Plastics. We added an international flair to our Conference Awards this year by giving Special Recognition Awards to Queen Elizabeth II and Nadia Sparkes of the UK for their recycling initiatives. Outreach work for the Keene School District is moving forward. Baseline Star Assessments were done last year and this year we were delighted to train school staff (and some Girl Scouts) on how to collect field data to conduct follow-up evaluations at their schools. We hope to complete our outreach this year with programming and recycling equipment for the Keene schools.

In just one year, New Hampshire the Beautiful has provided an enormous amount of support for recycling and anti-litter programs by:
